Welcome to our worship today on Palm Sunday as we mark and remember Jesus' entry into Jerusalem the week before he was killed. We receive palm crosses to aid our remembrance of this event. These of course are to be kept until next year where traditionally they are handed back to the church and burned so to produce the ash for the service on Ash Wednesday – the beginning of Lent 2020. We also this day have the *Passion Gospel* – the account of the trial and crucifixion of Jesus – this year according to the Gospel of Luke. So as we mark the start of Holy Week by remembering Jesus' *triumphal* entry into Jerusalem we know where the story is going – not only to the Cross but to the Resurrection. Given all of this we pray especially today for peace and reconciliation throughout the world – in homes and communities; in and between nations. We pray for peace and to ask God's blessing upon the world.

ABM Pew Reflections

Justice? Today we find ourselves at the foot of the Cross. Jesus, our teacher and friend, has been put to an agonising death. As the great Australian poet James McAuley writes in *O Jesus Crucified*, How can we pass by and not care? / It was our sins that nailed him there / On the cross. The centurion – an outsider, one of the military occupiers can see what the insiders cannot: 'Certainly this man was innocent,' he says. What justice is it for the Lamb of God? With McAuley let us pray: 'May we die to sin and so share / The triumph he enacted there / On the cross. Give thanks for the Anglican Church in Aotearoa, New Zealand and Polynesia, remembering especially the Church's Decade of Mission, 2016-2025.

Violence to Forgiveness – God's solution to our problem

In March our Bible study explored the 'human problem' as described in Genesis. While the Church commonly talks about sin as the cause of humanity's troubles, the stories in Genesis reveal the evil of violence – how desire can lead to rivalry with one another which can

lead to violence. The Garden story, Cain and Abel, the Flood, the Tower of Babel – these stories point to violence being the source of our problem. Genesis tells us stories of families dealing with rivalry and violence – Sarah and Hagar, Jacob and Esau, Joseph and his brothers. But Genesis shows us the solution in forgiveness. It tells us that to receive forgiveness is to 'see the face of God'. Jesus drew on these stories in his parables, describing God as a forgiving father. He taught his disciples just how crucial forgiveness is in our relationship with God – we should not even bother praying to God until we have forgiven! Violence cannot be defeated with violence – the only way to break its evil hold is to forgive.


