ABM Pew Reflections

It seems that the Roman Emperor Vespasian needed a striking victory to establish his rule, and so what had begun as the quelling of a revolt in Palestine, became an utter destruction. If you are taken to the base of the Temple Mount in Jerusalem today, you will see huge stones from the second temple, some as large as houses, tossed from the top of the Mount. It would have taken enormous effort, even as it would today, to accomplish this. Advent calls us again to consider the coming of Christ and Mark chapter 13 plunges us into his vision of the future. It reminds us that most of what we regard as permanent in our own lives is in fact temporary. Ultimately what we can rely on is Christ. *Come Lord Jesus!* We pray that we may live each day in the light of his coming. Give thanks for the work and witness of the Episcopal Church of Sudan.

JOURNEYS AT HOME

With the end of the lockdown and churches opening up again, this *Journey at Home* is the last one of 20. I want to warmly thank Sophia for providing this original, thoughtful and fascinating series on such a wide variety of topics as it has been a real treat each week.

Margaret Visser - The Geometry of Love

Margaret Visser is a Zambian born Canadian writer who studied in Paris, then received her Doctorate in Classics in Toronto. Her fascinating books, including *Much Depends on Dinner*, *The Rituals of Dinner* and *Giving Thanks* explore the anthropology and sociology of everyday rituals in an engaging and thought-provoking way.


When she proposed writing a book which explored, in detail, a single church she met with some objections – rather strangely, on the grounds that she is a Christian – brought up in the church as a child, drifting away from faith, then returning. She writes “it occurred to me then, and I am sure of it now, that it is much more likely to be helpful – not the reverse – to investigate the subject when you know it from the

“inside”. And get “inside” her chosen church she does – and takes us there with her.

The church she eventually chose is Sant’Agnese in Rome. At one level it is an “ordinary” parish church, very much engaged with its local community and Visser brings out many aspects – of worship, of space and of meaning – which it shares with innumerable other churches – but at another level it is extraordinary for its long and complicated history.

Sant’Agnese fuori le Mura — St Agnes outside the Walls – occupies a site over the catacomb where a girl, 12 or 13 years old, was buried some time in the 4th c - around 320 — after having been put to death for refusing to abandon her Christian faith. It is a patchwork of building, rebuilding – sometimes with recycled materials – an awkward, sometimes messy space which also has a significant role in the annual calendar of the Bishops of Rome. Although Visser “walks” us through the space, from the strange entry via a tunnel, this is the very opposite of the usual tourist “guided tour”. The subtitle of *The Geometry of Love* is *space, time, mystery, and meaning in an ordinary church*.

Certainly space and time – and, more subtly, the ways in which Christian buildings use one as a metaphor for the other – are certainly very important themes, to which she refers back constantly. But along the way (and it is, very much, a way which points to the Way) the writer treats us to multiple facets of information which enrich our understanding of the complexities of the church. Church history, the making of mosaics, the cult of the saints and relics, the role of images, “bad taste” in religion — and do we in fact need church buildings — are



just some of the many topics which she explores, managing to convey solid information with a discursiveness which is pleasing rather than irritating, because she also keeps an overall structure in view. For those who would like to explore further – or disagree with her views – the text has extensive, but unobtrusive, footnotes, and a bibliography, though it is definitely a text for the general reader, rather than the scholar.

Visser loves words, and their derivations, an interest well used in her radio segments published as *The Way We Are*. In discussing the basic architecture of the church, a regular basilica form, she alludes to the familiar image of the church as the ship (*navis*, from which the term nave is derived), our ark to bring us safely through to God. But did you know that the word “aisles” comes from the Latin for “wings”? The early believers saw the ship as driven onwards by the combined efforts of banks of rowers, rising and falling like the wings of a bird – a powerful image of our collective,

harmonized worship. Apropos of the pervasive symbolism of square, cross and sphere/dome with typical humour she notes “Kosmos in Greek means not only “world” but also “order and decency” and “decorative comeliness”. (From *kosmos* we get the word cosmetics.)” Like many other “modifications” – some good, some not so good, Sant’Agnese was “provided” with a dome in the early 17th c.

Although criticized by one reviewer for being “too Christian” (most reviews were overwhelmingly positive) Visser certainly does not balk at some of the very questionable aspects of Christian cult. She remains conscious of the paradoxical aspects of our faith. In a passage which I will quote in full, set at the beginning of her exploration of the main “body” of the church she writes



From one point of view, the mystical, Christianity is a series of oppositions transcended. From another, the ethical and psychological, Christianity turns the value systems of what Jesus called “this world” on its head. By “this world” Jesus meant the world as it is presently organized, insofar as it stands in deliberate opposition to God’s will. The ideal that Jesus revealed is “the kingdom of God” in which power, violence and selfishness are rejected. In this alternative order, the poor own the kingdom, the merciful receive mercy, the gentle “inherit the earth”. And those who are persecuted for the sake of the truth are, if we could only comprehend the breadth of the perspective offered, fortunate and blessed.

The church of St Agnes was built in honour of a young girl who was put to death because of what she believed. She was buried here, in this place, by her family and friends. The people who shared her beliefs visited her grave, and were convinced, not that the cruel brevity of her life was a shame and a waste, but that she had shown a bravery and an integrity that they all wished they could attain.

The girl’s name, *Hagnus* in Greek, sounds like the Latin word for “lamb”, *agnus* and she is always shown with, or carrying, a lamb. On her feast day, January 21st, a charming ceremony sees two rose-crowned lambs carried into the church to be blessed. Their wool, when they mature, will form part of the pallium, a



short white stole worn by the Pope and archbishops, signifying their role as shepherds. (The palliums when woven are placed as close as possible to the burial site of St Peter to be dedicated).

Reviewers were disappointed that the book included no images of what Visser describes (although the paperback has a view of the church interior on the cover).

There is, of course, no true substitute for the real thing. There

is a richly illustrated “tour” of the church and surrounds at

However, these two images may give you an inkling of the space, and of the striking mosaic of Agnes in the apse.

But for Visser’s interesting discussion of the symbolism in these images – including the halo – you will need to read the book.
